The Easter Way of Life

The daily headlines read like Christ's crucifixion. There is unending war in central Asia, Main Street continues to struggle with the wolves of Wall Street continuing to profit, the gap between the "Haves" and the "Have-Nots" continues to widen and deepen. We live in a world with too many people are being "left behind", not just kids. All this hurts Jesus. All these are blows of the hammer nailing Jesus to the cross.

To enter into the joy of Easter and the qualities of light, I need reminders that Jesus was not "cured of death," as theologian James Alison puts it, but that Jesus kept fidelity with life.



His Way of Life begins in the light of an empty tomb. And so we should not cling to our ways of death but embrace those things which inspire us and give us hope; that our hope will inspire hope to live in others. And as Mary Magdalene, the first apostle, sent to bear the good news of Jesus resurrection to the Twelve, our hope shall rest in the living Christ, not just the Christ found in the gospels and the writings of Paul, but the Christ we see in the myriads of people we greet, talk to and break bread with each day. Like Jesus, on the road to Emmaus, the living Christ comes to us in the seemingly mundane things of life, breaking bread and sharing the joy, love and laughter and triumphs and even the tragedies of our lives.

In his Way of Life, Jesus breathes peace and forgiveness on his disciples. When people equate greatness with the ability to belittle and bully others; when voices decry the immigrant, those of a different faith or color as reasons to fear and cry for deportations and special identification cards; will we lift our voices to protect all of God's children? Will we have the strength to forgive our enemies; as we too, like St. Paul, were once enemies of the cross of Christ?

Jesus engaged Thomas' in the questions of his heart. Is our faith strong enough to hold amidst the doubts of our own hearts? Will we risk to engaging with those of a different faith, the Jew, the Muslim, the Hindu. Jesus teaches Peter about nature of love itself. Love is about feeding and caring for others and holding fast to each other when all around you are frightened and want to flee. Can we live as community, as family, not always agreeing but always loving and forgiving and maintain fidelity with one another when times are hard?

Jesus sends the disciples on *His Way*, into a new world to contend with the principalities and powers of this world, until their final defeat. Will we dedicate ourselves to bringing light to the corners of our neighborhoods that are held in darkness by addiction, poverty, prejudice and oppression? Will we honor our baptismal promises by respecting the God given dignity of every human being regardless of nationality, race, faith or sexual orientation? Will we engage in the struggle for justice and freedom for all people, not merely those who think, look and act like us? And will we by the sharing of our goods, secure that dignity, justice and freedom for all?

Hearing the darkness of our public discourse blaring in my ears, and confronting my own darkness that dogs me at every step this Lent, I am ready to embrace the Way of Life. After all, we are people of joy. We walk in illumination. Where we pass, may our footprints glow with the light of Christ and life will blossom along our path. Come, live in the Light!





Lyra 2004

Although the Russian Orthodox Church has inspired vocal music of incredible beauty, that music doesn't get sung much by stateside ensembles: There's a language barrier, and few singers can navigate complex modal harmonies without accompaniment. The solution? Import a Russian ensemble. Belsville's Lutheran Church of the Abiding Presence brought in six members of Lyra, a St. Petersburg-based vocal collective, Saturday night. Despite the church's flat acoustics, Lyra produced a pure a cappella sound that could both fill the intimate space and drop to an edge-of-your-seat whisper, and the ensemble coordination remained impeccable through even the most complex polyphony. The group's clear harmonies gave a sense of how the unique flavor of Orthodox music persists in both the clean, bright music of 17th-century Dmitri Bortniansky and the aching chromatics of turn-of-the-last-century Pavel Tchesnokov. Dobri Khristov's "Praise the name of the Lord" made the greatest impression of all, though, because it featured a solo by Vladimir Feliauer, one of those force-of-nature Russian basses, whose tone was rock-solid and velvet-smooth no matter how low he went. After the sampling of intense, elevated Orthodox music, the singers' post-intermission entrance in traditional dress and singing a jaunty folk tune brought everything back to earth. The simpler music offered showcase solos for most of the singers, and lots of broad acting, like Ekaterina Isatchenko's charmingly coquettish posing in "Black-browed, black-eyed fellow", partially made up for the lack of texts and translations. Yet it was the Russian Orthodox music, especially in Lyra's fine performances, that left one wanting more.

Vestry Meeting, February 16, 2016 Minutes

The Vestry and Rector of St. Thomas met on Tuesday, February 16, 2016 at 6:00 p.m. in the Parish House. Present were the Rector, Jeff Douglas, the Treasurer, Ernie Carter, and Vestry members, Hugh Davis, Claudia Griffin, Brenda Hewitt, Patsy Jones, Fred Liverman, Daniel McCamish, David Simons, and Robert Outland.

The Rector opened the meeting with a prayer.

Prior Minutes. The minutes of the January 26th Vestry meeting were reviewed and approved.

Treasurer's Report. The treasurer's report for January 2016 was read and approved. This year we will only need an internal audit, so a committee will be formed to take care of it.

The annual **Parochial Report** is being prepared. The Vestry will see a copy in March. All Vestry members have signed the **Vestry Declaration and Promise**, and the **Sexual Ethics Policy**. The **Leadership Report** to the Diocese is also being prepared, containing a list of names and addresses of the Vestry officers.

The **Soup Kitchen** will be held on Thursday, February 18th and 25th.

A **Medical Mission** to the Dominican Republic is being planned for June 11th – 18th.

In February and March, the topic for **Lent Study** will be the book, <u>Meeting Jesus at the Margins:</u> Meditations on Matthew 25.

Pastoral Care. The Rector has been visiting with several parishioners who are grieving the loss of a loved one, and/or dealing with major health issues.

A detailed **Junior Warden's Report** was provided to the Vestry. The estimate for upgrading the **sound system in the church**, at an approximate total cost of \$3,000, was approved at the January meeting. This time it was reaffirmed, and a copy was signed by the Clerk. An estimate for **yard work**, totaling \$1,800, was tabled until more information could be obtained.

Security has become more of an issue since someone stole the altar candles, a brass collection plate, and several metal folding chairs prior to the Sunday, February 14th services. The police were contacted, and an effort is being made to recover the items. It was generally agreed that we should keep the sanctuary locked, and only allow access to approved guests. It was moved and approved that a **coded lock** be installed on the choir entrance, just like the one leading to the Sacristy. Also, **Lock boxes** have been installed on the **thermostats** to keep guests from changing the settings.

From the Senior Warden:



"We are one in the Spirit...We are one in the Lord"

On the first night of this year's Diocesan Convention, I experienced a powerful evocation of the Holy Spirit and felt energized by our church. As my mother mentioned when she reported on convention in church, we filled St. Cyprian's (New Bern) for a concert by the St. Augustine's University Choir (an enjoyable and spiritually fulfilling concert in itself); however, the choir was delayed, so we passed the time with an

impromptu hymn sing, as two youth delegates alternated on piano, and, proving the Episcopal Church has feet planted in both the past and the future, since we sat in hymnal-less pews, we looked up lyrics to traditional hymns on smart phones. Never one to turn down a chance to sing, I certainly sang out, and so did many others, as we made our voices one through this spontaneous celebration of faith and grace. With the need to look on for lyrics (particularly on later stanzas), the number of voices shifted at times, but it was jointly joyful and calming with each hymn. Our final hymn, sung just as St. Aug's singers arrived, proved the most powerful in multiple ways. The youth delegates called for us to sing "We Are Christian," and this proved to be the song with the most voices. From throughout our congregation, all seemed to know this familiar tune, so smart phones didn't have to be consulted. I first learned this song as a child at Camp McDowell (in Alabama), and, with one exception from several years later (but also several years ago), I have not sung it since. However, as we started singing it, the words comfortably fell into place. That comfort resonated especially as we sang in a blended voice "And we'll guard each man's dignity and save each man's pride." Given all the Episcopal Church is dealing with today, particularly in terms of our relationship with the rest of the Anglican Communion, this line echoed throughout St. Cyprian's, as a lyrical reminder of the church's mission, and, despite this happening "off script," this moment was a musical introduction to one of Bishop Skirving's themes for the convention: Unity.

Throughout the meetings, we discussed tapping potential already within the Diocese to unite, align, and grow. As I said when reporting about Convention, there was a tremendous sense of harmony throughout the convention floor, and that had a further uplifting effect. We have as our Bishop a

man who is both graceful and gracious, and his calming and quick-witted style serves both him and the Diocese well. In his first year, he has taken measure of our Diocese and is working to help bring parishes together despite the challenges we at times face in terms of both population and geography. Much of that work will come through work within the Deaneries, and with our "very groovy" rector Jeff now Dean of the Albemarle, it is exciting and refreshing to know that St. Thomas' will play and take a significant role in these efforts. The church at all levels faces challenges, but, just as Bishop Skirving reminded us as we used the convention theme of "Equipping the Saints" to lead us through our discussions, the leadership is in place to equip and prepare all for the challenges to come, and the potential—in the Diocese and the parish—is there and waiting to be tapped.

In this Lenten season, like the church itself, we once again face many of the same challenges of the (recent) past, and the potential for finding a path around or to overcome those challenges must be tapped. However, just as Bishop Skirving was able to offer a positive and hopeful view of the challenges faced by the church, so, too, may we find the positivity and hope that surrounds us, both as a parish and as individuals. His calm and level approach can help us see ways that we might respond to adversity or confusion, and it certainly offers a way to remember unity as we seek to "save each man's pride."

When I was a freshman in college, I heard a singer & storyteller named Paula Larke. Throughout her performance, she sang a mixture of new and traditional songs, primarily in the folk tradition, interspersed with story-telling. At the end of her show, she asked us all to sing along with her on one final number, and she began quietly singing "We are Christian," building the volume with each verse. Just like the moment in St. Cyprian's, the song came back to me almost immediately. As Ms. Larke ended the song and her concert, however, she shifted the lyrics to "And they'll know we are human by our love." As she explained afterwards when a few of us got to talk to her, she did not mean to suggest being human and Christian were synonymous; instead, she felt that what we needed to share throughout humanity was our love, and she said she struggled to understand how one people couldn't share their love. For her, sharing and showing love was as natural as breathing, and, to her, singing was a bonding experience that helped evoke the power of the spirit. All of us felt her joy at that show and the energy that came from blending our voices into a single reminder of our charge as both Christians and humans. At Convention in New Bern, I felt that same sense of electricity, for, though the song was not planned, it most definitely pulsed throughout the congregation and reminded us of the unity of Christian love. At St. Thomas', especially, we are bound and driven by our unity of Christian love, and I was certainly very proud to represent our parish at convention; may all continue to know the humans of St. Thomas' as we reach out throughout our community with our love.


