# VESTRY NOTES by Daniel McCamish, Vestry Clerk

The Vestry and Rector of St. Thomas met on Tuesday, April 21, 2015 at 6:00 p.m. in the Parish House. Present were the Rector, Jeff Douglas, and Vestry members, Hugh Davis, Patsy Jones, Fred Liverman, Daniel McCamish, Gretchen Simons, Mike Steczak, and Lindsay Vaughan.

The Rector opened the meeting with a prayer.

**Prior Minutes.** The minutes of the March Vestry meeting were reviewed and approved with one minor correction.

**Treasurer's Report.** The treasurer's report for March, 2015, was read and approved. Included in this report is a large disbursement of capital gains from the Braxton Britt estate, due to the liquidation of stocks. It was moved and approved that the Treasurer will be directed to put these funds into an investment account; and that the Braxton Britt Committee (consisting of Ernie Carter, Gretchen Simons, Bubba Peele, and Johnny Griffin) will convene and discuss the future use of these funds.

Service. The Soup Kitchen will be held on Thursday, April 23<sup>rd</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup>.

St. Thomas will participate in *Stop Hunger Now!* with 1<sup>st</sup> Presbyterian and Ahoskie United Methodist Church on Saturday, April 25<sup>th</sup>. Cost will be \$1,000 per church. Ten thousand meals will be packed and stored for distribution in an emergency.

The Medical Mission trip to the Dominican Republic has been tentatively scheduled for August 28<sup>th</sup> – September 4<sup>th</sup>. However, the possibility of putting it off until next year was also discussed.

**Worship.** A joint Rogation Celebration service with St. Thomas, Windsor at Grace in Lewiston Woodville has been scheduled for May 17<sup>th</sup> at 11:15 a.m.

It was suggested that the musician should be commended for the times he plays the organ during services. Many parishioners enjoy the organ and would like to hear it every week.

**Education.** New teachers are needed as Gretchen Simons and Beth Douglas retire from teaching Children's Sunday School. This task could be shared by a group of people, who can also help design a curriculum for the small children who will be attending.

There will be two confirmations on May 24<sup>th</sup> (Pentecost) for Robby and Mary Outland, at St. Paul's in Edenton. The Rector is also working with Jackson and Christiana to get them confirmed sometime later this year or next.

**Pastoral Care.** The Rector has been visiting with several parishioners who are dealing with major health issues.

**Jr. Warden's Report.** It was moved and approved that we hire a contractor to remove shrubs and do other work on the landscaping in the Bazemore lot. This will take 2 people three days and cost \$670. Included in this motion was the hiring of another contractor to repair a storm drain at a cost of \$100 plus materials. If these contractors work out, we will consider hiring them to do more work.

The Junior Warden will look into options for replacing the water heater. Summer would be a good time to do this. Replacing the unit will save on electricity and potentially expensive service calls.

The office hallway in the Parish House needs to be painted. This hasn't been done in 20 years.

The meeting adjourned at 7:15 p.m. The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, May 19, 2015 at 6:00 p.m. in the Parish House.

# Harvest for Hospitality

Dear Father Jeff:

We are grateful for your generous donation to the Harvest for Hospitality Campaign benefiting the Episcopal Farmworker Ministry from the congregation.

You may not be aware of some of the important programs the Episcopal Farmworker Ministry offers to over 3,500 farmworkers each growing season in Johnston, Harnett, and Sampson Counties in eastern North Carolina. EFwM provides clothing and toiletry kit items to farmworkers; pesticide education and training as well as outreach visitation to the farmworker camps. When we include the families of farmworkers; we reach an additional 10,000 people.

In 2014, over 7,000 individuals utilized the monthly food bank and 2,000 people sought immigration assistance services. The Episcopal Farmworker Ministry is the only entity in the area to serve farmworkers. The ministry additionally provides programming to assist with English as a Second Language classes, income tax preparation, transportation and translation services as well as a thriving sacramental ministry.

The generous donation of \$671.25 to the Harvest for Hospitality campaign will ensure the Episcopal Farmworker Ministry will be sustained for decades to continue the important work of welcoming the stranger at our door. Again, thanks to you and the parishioners of St. Thomas, Ahoskie.

#### Project Lazarus has risen in our community!

Project Lazarus, a program to help communities deal with the increasing problem of opioid addiction in our community. As opioids, (Percocet, oxycodone, hydrocodone, etc.) have becoming more routinely prescribed for pain in our society; addiction rates have begun to soar. This has led to an extensive black market in the selling of these drugs and their illegal use and even given rise to increased heroin addiction as access to these medications is withdrawn. Project Lazarus has come to engage all facets of our community in raising awareness of this problem, providing for ways to safely dispose of these drugs when no longer needed and advocate for solutions for helping prevent and treat addiction. ## The Small Church Leadership Conference 2015

It Began With Twelve was the theme of the conference at Trinity Center from Apr 19<sup>th</sup> – 21<sup>st</sup>. Small churches were invited to send representatives to share and learn about the many varied ways small churches live and do ministry in eastern North Carolina. Forty-five people came from around our diocese to participate.

The Rev. Jay Sidebotham presented stories and ideas of what makes and keeps small churches vital places of mission and ministry. Our new bishop, Rob Skirving also began a conversation around what kind of structures: partnerships, clusters, etc. might look in our diocese to ensure that priestly presence continues in the context of rising costs and rural isolation in our diocese.

Workshops were presented on website availability through the diocesan office and the use of Facebook and other social media to communicate and promote the Gospel and parish. A workshop on Christian education was also presented.

What I found most intriguing was listening to the many creative ways in which small churches are doing ministry and witnessing in their communities. Preliminary readings of the evaluations showed that the people who attended also thought the conference was not only worthwhile but worth developing further.
